Delegations

a. Stephanie Spencer - Sport Nova Scotia

Stephanie Spencer from Sport Nova Scotia provided members of the committee with a summary of the Multisport program that has been taking place in the community for several years. The program has several indicators of success; waiting lists, positive feedback, and eleven other programs around the province that are following the Antigonish model.

Sport Nova Scotia is now looking at setting up a multi-sport system: Antigonish Community Sport Collective. Stephanie reviewed the potential benefits of the program, including the partnerships with various organizations throughout the community and province.

A request was made for \$30,000 of support, split evenly between the Town and County, to help to fund the program. These funds would help to cover a staff position, and other amenities, including office space, municipal staff and resource support, would also requested for consideration.

Discussion followed. Stephanie was thanked for her presentation, and the Councils will take the requests back for further consideration.

b. St. Francis Xavier Administration Team

Dr. Kent MacDonald was joined by several members of his senior administration team. He provided the Committee with a general update and review of the





operations at the University, and touched on aspects of community collaboration that have happened in the last year, including the new sidewalk along West Street, and the Skateboard Park project. Both the Town and County were thanked for the various ways of support offered.

Discussion followed. Warden McCarron thanked Dr. MacDonald and his team for all of the contributions that St. FX makes to the community, and for coming to speak to the committee this evening.

Additions to the Agenda

a. Single-Use Plastics

Mayor Boucher spoke to an initiative from several municipalities across the province, who are lobbying the province to restrict or ban single-use plastics, such as plastic bags. This subject has come up at the Town Council meeting, but there was a desire to speak to the Joint Council committee because of the overlap with retail community. Businesses that the Mayor has spoken with recently have felt favourably towards moving away from the use of plastic bags.

Members of the Committee felt that it would be important for both the Town and County to move together on this initiative. A suggestion was also made to further engage the local business community, by holding meetings, to get feedback on the initiative. Mr. Lawrence suggested that the issue be deferred to staff for analysis and a report, to provide each Council with further information. Discussion followed.

Antigonish REMO Current Accomplishments (Since Jan. 2018)

- Moved ECC (Emergency Command Centre) from RK MacDonald Nursing Home to Antigonish County Office
 - Designed communications cabinets and installed them.
 - Designed, built and installed antennas and masts (x4)
 - Programmed, installed and tested 3 VHF and a TMR communication equipment.
- Arranged and hosted TMR2 Communications Course for Public Safety Field Communications (PSFC)
- Purchased and installed Smart TV in Radio Room. Installed computer system in Radio Room.
- Hosted Exercise Handshake (a monthly provincial exercise) with EMO Advisory Committee and PSFC manager
- Hosted Emergency Preparedness Week public demonstration
- Participated in Police Awareness demonstration in Pomquet
- Attended Symposium for Maritime Amateur Radio Techs (SMART) (Springhill)
- Represented Antigonish at the Eastern Zone Meetings

Household hazardous waste (HHW) is leftover household products that contain corrosive, toxic, ignitable, or reactive ingredients. Proper disposal protects both our health and the environment.


June 2007, Antigonish councils held their first HHW event. The first couple were held at the County Public Works Building, on Hwy 7. Since 2009, they've been held at the Antigonish Mall Parking Lot. The Municipality of the District of Guysborough has provided the Mobile Collection Service since 2008. It is an annual event, on a Friday and Saturday, now during the month of September. We learned this Winter that Guysborough may not be able to provide this service going forward. This is a good opportunity to consider a permanent depot option for Antigonish.

What are some of the benefits of a permanent facility?

- To provide a year-round option for residents
- To reduce a fire hazard in resident's homes & other buildings
- To reduce disposal in other inappropriate locations (garbage/woods/shop drain)

How does the current program work?

The event is advertised for free through public service announcements from local radio stations. Also, for the last event a free advertisement placed The Casket using newspaper credits and the information was also through social media. Event costs are invoiced to the Municipality of the County of Antigonish. Half the set-up costs and one-third the disposal costs are invoiced to the Town. Eastern Region Solid Waste Management submits a funding application to Divert NS to receive your share of \$16,000 (shared with Pictou County, dependant on total costs) and a portion returned to the Town.

What are some of the differences to consider with a Permanent Depot?

A permanent depot would have year-round operating expenses rather than set-up costs. A current waste management facility location would provide other options to divert or dispose of non-HHW materials. The users (number of cars) could be tracked using a log book to determine if the one-third Town, two-thirds County is the appropriate proportion to allocate for disposal expenses. Also, with a permanent facility, eligible Divert NS funding expenses would include disposal and advertising cost only.

Others consideration for a permanent facility include:

- · A required NS Environment Terms & Conditions Approval
- Fire Marshall Approval not required if without power
- · Appropriate Staff Training
 - WHIMIS
 - Lab Packing
- · Hazardous Waste Disposal Company Agreement
- Agreement with other users
- Site Control (could also limit hours)
- Other expenses such as: Spill Kit & Eye Wash Station

Options

This program has worked really well as a Special Event in Antigonish but could improve with year-round access. There is necessity to continue with a mobile or permanent HHW program. Some options to consider:

- Construct a permanent HHW building (hours & access to be determined) by the Municipality of the County of Antigonish at the Beech Hill Waste Management Facility with an agreement between both municipalities to continue as a program for all Antigonish residents.
- Construction by the Town of Antigonish with an agreement between both municipalities to continue the program for all Antigonish residents.
- Either of the above with an option to include a mobile event if it is deemed necessary; every two or three years for example.
- Rather than a permanent Household Hazardous Waste building, contract with another disposal company such as Terrapure to provide special event pricing. When priced before this was considerably more expensive and doesn't provide year-round access.
