Call to Order - Chairman, Warden Owen McCarron

The meeting of the Committee of the Whole was called to order by the Chair, Warden McCarron, at 5:35pm.

Approval of Agenda

Warden McCarron called for any additions or deletions to the agenda.

Moved and Seconded

That the agenda be approved as presented.

Motion Carried



Approval of October 26, 2021 Committee of the Whole Minutes

Warden McCarron called for any errors or omissions in the minutes.

Moved and Seconded

That the Committee of the Whole minutes of October 26, 2021 be approved as presented.

Motion Carried

Business Arising from the Minutes

Mr. Horne provided an update regarding the Safe Restart Funding information that was shared at the last meeting and noted that staff continues to collect information and will bring the item back to a future Committee meeting.

Delegations

Basil Pitts - Roads and Winter Operations Discussion

Warden McCarron introduced Basil Pitts, Area Manager for the Provincial Department of Public Works. Mr. Pitts provided an overview of the capital works that was completed over the past construction season. This included paving and gravel roads projects. Ongoing capital projects work for the next construction season was also reviewed.

Mr. Pitts then reviewed the roads priorities lists that are provided by Council every six months and reviewed how the lists from the County and other organizations in the community are compiled and utilized when capital projects planning is underway. Mr. Pitts then reviewed a list of discussion topics provided in advance by Council, covering topics such as:

- Line Painting
- The intersection at the Mulgrave turn-off in Aulds Cove
- Trunk 4 / Route 16 confirming a roundabout at that intersection scheduled for next construction season
- Aulds Cove fire hall drainage work

The floor was then opened for questions. Further discussion took place regarding:

- The RIM and gravel roads programs, and how funding is distributed through the service area
- Brush cutting concerns and how the work is being tendered out
- Equipment acquisitions by the local department

Councillors also asked about specific roadways or concerns in their districts.



Mr. Pitts was thanked by the Warden and Council for attending the meeting and answering all of their questions.

Jason Parise - SWEB Development

Warden McCarron introduced Jason Parise from SWEB Development. Mr. Parise gave a presentation that provided an overview of SWEB Development and the turbine project that they are exploring. Following the presentation, the Committee had an opportunity to ask questions. Clarification was asked regarding:

- Open house details and advertising plans
- The number of turbines that are expected
- The anticipated cost of the project

Mr. Parise also provided some further information about funding contributions and land acquisitions. Warden McCarron thanked him for his presentation.

Continuing Business

Covid-19 Vaccination Policy

Mrs. Schumacher reviewed the revisions to the policy that were made based on the direction provided by the Committee at the last meeting. Instead of selecting a specific date, the policy was written to require full vaccination immediately and outlines what steps could be taken if an individual covered by the policy was not vaccinated. Accommodations for those not vaccinated for reasons covered under human rights legislation were included in the policy. Discussion followed. While members of Council are not covered by the policy, by consensus they all agreed to show their Proof of Vaccination to demonstrate their support for the policy.

Moved and Seconded

The Committee recommends that Municipal Council adopt the Municipal Covid-19 Vaccination Policy as presented.

Motion Carried

<u>Information on Provincial Government Bills and Proposed Policy Affecting</u> <u>Municipalities</u>

Mr. Horne provided an introduction to the memo prepared by staff outlining various bills recently passed or under consideration by the Province, and facilitated a discussion with the Committee about the proposed non-resident taxes noted in the Minister's letter that were issued by the Premier in September. Concerns were raised regarding the impact on rural and coastal property owners in the County, particularly seasonal residents, those who are holding vacant property to develop in the future, and those who are inheriting property. There is also a concern with taxes traditionally collected



for municipalities now being levied by the Province. Mr. Horne also noted that the Province is also looking to renegotiate the Service Exchange with municipalities. Discussion followed.

New Business

<u>Community Engagement Liaison Recommendation</u>

Mr. Horne reviewed the Request for Proposals process that was undertaken for the selection of a Community Engagement Liaison consultant to assist during the process of consideration of whether to pursue consolidation with the Town. The bid by Brighter Community Planning Consulting was selected following a review of the proposals received and is being recommended for approval by staff.

Moved and Seconded

The Committee recommends that Municipal Council awards the tender for the Community Engagement and Liaison project to Brighter Community Planning Consulting for the bid price of \$142,628.75 (incl HST).

Motion Carried

Winter Parking Regulations

Mrs. Schumacher spoke to the annual Winter Parking Regulations that are put in place from December 1 to April 15th, to prohibit parking on streets maintained by the County overnight and when winter storms are happening as a means of keeping the roads clear to facilitate winter snow removal. The regulations will be advertised in the paper and online once they are signed by the RCMP, who serve as the County's traffic authority.

Moved and Seconded

The Committee recommends that Municipal Council approve the signing of the Order for Winter Parking Regulations for 2021-22 setting out the period from December 1, 2021 to April 15, 2022 as the time in which Winter Parking Regulations will be in effect on roads/streets under the jurisdiction of the County of Antigonish.

Approval of the F21/22 Statement of Estimates Report

Mrs. Duggan provided members of the Committee with an overview of the Statement of Estimates, which is part of the required reporting to the Province and uses information contained within the budget approved by Council earlier in the year.



Moved and Seconded

That Municipal Council approve the Fiscal Year 2021/22 Statement of Estimates A & B.

Consideration of the Consolidated Water Budget

Mrs. Duggan provided an overview of the consolidated water budget, going through the document in detail and providing updates on expenditures including staffing increases, water main break repairs, and the purchase of additional meters. Members of the Committee were provided with the opportunity to ask any questions. Mrs. Duggan was thanked for her presentation and staff's work in preparing the budget.

Councillor MacFarlane provided his thanks and positive feedback on the work being done to replace the waterline on the South River Road. Mr. Horne provided his thanks to the staff team who handled the water break during the week previous.

Moved and Seconded

That Municipal Council approve the Consolidated Water Budget as proposed.

- Councillor McNamara provided an update on the mobile flu shot clinic held in Havre Boucher during the past several weeks. He also provided an update on a community cleanup that took place in Havre Boucher.

COADY INSTITUTE



The connection between **St. Francis Xavier University, Coady Institute**, and the **Municipality of the County of Antigonish** is long and rich. Rising to
meet the moment almost a century ago the University
created the **Extension Department** in an effort to
help reshape the economic backbone of our region
through a cooperative movement that became known
as the **Antigonish Movement**.

In 1959, in response to people from all over the world arriving in Antigonish to learn how to replicate an Antigonish Movement-like experience in their countries and communities, StFX established Coady International Institute. For the next few decades, Extension (locally) and Coady (internationally) worked to help people help themselves, first through cooperatives and credit unions and more recently through a variety of other community-driven, assetbased and citizen-led models of development.















Over the years, Coady Institute has brought 7,000+ community development practitioners from 130 countries to Antigonish. Many local families have a story or two about a Coady participant that they know, whether through inviting them to share a meal at home, assisting as a conversation partner, in church, or through one of the many course-based field trips. These opportunities allow Coady participants to learn from local experiences with community development. In recent years, participants have engaged with officials from the County of Antigonish during various courses.

The County and Coady have functioned in a synergetic way for 60+ years. This relationship was evident during the Institute's 50th anniversary year when, through the generosity of the local community and many others, Coady moved to the centre of the StFX campus further strengthening the Institute's relationship with the community. The effort led to Coady honouring local residents with the creation of the **Antigonish Community Foyer**.

The Antigonish Community Foyer is named after the people of this community who gave so generously of their money over the years, of their time and their volunteering to help make this organization what it means in the world. It is a significant organization with a significant world meaning, and today, I'm thrilled that it's here and we have the opportunity to support it and we have the opportunity to help develop, deliver programs that help so many people.

Coady Institute has brought global attention to Antigonish. No other community in Canada has such a unique institute that combines education programs, community engagement, and partner capacity building internationally and locally. Coady continues to provide programs that promote education, innovation, group action, and sustainable economic activities increasing the cooperation and networking of community-based organizations and educational institutions around the world and in our own Antigonish community. We know that focusing on gender equality, women's leadership, and initiatives with Indigenous women leaders and African Nova Scotians creates healthy communities.



I think we have a powerful but gentle message right here in our own backyard and it is really something that we have to open our eyes to and appreciate. {We need} to connect with Coady and keep it growing because what it's done internationally...I'm so grateful that, as an Antigonisher, as somebody from the county, not only could I leverage StFX but most importantly, I could leverage the Coady for my particular career path. Our **Centre for Employment Innovation**, also a part of Coady, is working closely with the Province of Nova Scotia and Nova Scotia Works Centres to improve the success rate for under-represented populations to find work. Our **Innovation and Enterprise Centre** runs many programs to help those in our community wanting to start their own businesses. Coady courses such as **Future of Work and Workers**, **Social Enterprise**, and **Livelihoods and Markets** are drawing increasing numbers of participants from our community and Province. This international and local focus is one reason Shannon Stephenson, local lawyer and businessperson, is chairing the current **Coady Change Leaders campaign**.

I really believe passionately in the Coady Institute and what it does on the international stage, what it does on the Canadian stage, and what it does locally. I believe it's done so much for so many people. It's just an amazing organization and we're just so fortunate to have such an organization in such a small community. It makes us a bigger, more diverse, and more interesting place.

During the last year, Coady has had to reimagine, redesign, and rearrange our courses and ability to reach people. Rather than fail in these uncertain times, our online programs have thrived. The participation of so many Canadians (especially Nova Scotians) in Coady online programs has been a wonderful surprise. Our online participant numbers have doubled, as the accessibility has allowed us to reach more. However, the heart of the Institute, one that we share with Antigonish each year, is to have participants attend Coady programs in person, experience life in our town, study local businesses, talk with local entrepreneurs and business people, and share together best practices, innovations, and friendships. In 2022, we will look forward to welcoming our Coady participants 'home'.

The Coady Change Leader Campaign will provide scholarships for people, both locally and globally, to attend Coady leadership education programs. We ask the Municipality of the County of Antigonish to join the local business and medical communities and a network of supportive individuals in contribution to our local scholarship campaign.

The purpose of the campaign is to make it possible for leaders from all over the world (and right here in our own backyard) to come together to learn and share about the latest innovations in community development and leadership. We are asking the Municipality of the County of Antigonish to consider making a \$5,000/year commitment for the 5-year campaign period.

When you think about how we live today, we are all global citizens. When things get better in the rest of the world, they get better for us as well. It's all about being global citizens and making the globe better for everybody.

Dear Harris:

The Havre Boucher & Area CDRA serving District 9 is seeking your assistance to address the failure of a critical piece of our community center equipment. As you know during Covid our facility was closed to community activity and we scaled back or shut down equipment to mitigate our costs. We are now gradually reopening, and our weekly Dart Club League was the first to reengage in indoor community activity during the Province's Stage 5. This is the first center generated revenue in a year and a half.

Temperatures have dipped to the point where heat is required. The heating system, consisting of 2 main heat pumps units, was restarted. However, we received complaints that the building wasn't warm enough. Upon inspection we discovered one of the heat pumps had shut down and the second unit does not have the capacity to make up for the lost BTU's. Our service provider tested and inspected the system today and advised the unit had failed, it is not repairable and would need to be replaced. The unit is original equipment and has been in service for 16 years. The twin unit failed previously in a similar manner and had to be replaced. If we wish to continue to reopen, we need to replace this unit before the weather gets colder.

We were closed all of our fiscal year 2020-21 because of Covid restrictions and lost the revenue generated from activities based out of the center. We were fortunate to have received the operating grant from the County to help cover operating costs. We have been closed half of the current fiscal year including the summer period, which provides the greatest opportunity for revenue generation. We anticipate a deficit of \$10,000 for the current year on regular operations. In addition to this deficit we are projecting an expense of \$10,000 to repair our retaining wall. It had been planned to delay this until 2022-23 but significant movement this past winter and recommendations of an engineer and an architect are to address the repair now or risk undermining the main wall.

We are seeking your financial support of \$6,500 to replace one heat pump unit. This request is supported by an estimate from our service provider.

Dear Harris:

As a follow up to my letter of November 3, 2021, I thought I would provide you with additional information that highlights the impact that Covid had on our operations in support of our request.

The Covid restrictions required us to close our community center. Obviously, this had a huge social impact in our community because we could not gather as we normally did. Additionally, it had a huge impact on our revenues because while the center drives our social activities it also drives our revenues.

We were unable to rent the center for weddings, anniversaries and gatherings, we lost the weekly revenue of darts and sewing, our weekly card plays were suspended, our monthly ceilidhs were cancelled, our fitness center was shut down, pickleball stopped, our bar was closed and we were just about to start another Chase The Ace fund raiser as covid shuts downs began.

Given we operate close to break even in a normal year you can appreciate that, with the disappearance of revenue, our operations are gravely challenged. We did undertake cost saving measures with utilities and staffing but you still have insurance and heat and phone and other service-related costs to cover.

However, even as we start to reopen, we are not out of the woods. We expect revenue generating activities will not have the same participation rate as pre-covid and not all activities will be able to start right away. Chase The Ace will not be successful in the current climate and it will take a while before it will be determined if it is worthwhile. We hope to see card plays restart in the new year but our monthly ceilidhs will not resume, if they do, until whatever the new wave number is over. We will not have gym drop-ins or birthday party and anniversary party rentals. What ever function we conduct it will not generate the same profit as in the past.

The financial strains of the past year and a half and the uneasiness of the next year that we have identified herein is intended to reinforce our request for support to resolve our heating system issue.




